At the moment, this data is from 2011-12, but as part of the consultation, the DfE is proposing to use data from 2013-14 (which is the most recent data available in the required format required) and then update this when new data becomes available.

To pay for the year-to-year protections, the DfE is proposing to introduce a gains cap (i.e. a limit on how much a local authority s funding can increase by) of **4.5% for three-and four-year-old funding** and **8.6% for two-year-old funding**.

The DfE has modelled the likely impact of these changes on early years funding rates for each local authority in 2023-24 here. It is important to note that these figures are the rates that local councils are likely to receive, not necessarily what
